From the Pastor's Pen

The Investment of Bible Memorization

Dallas Willard, professor of Philosophy at the University of California, wrote, "Bible memorization is absolutely fundamental to spiritual formation. If I had to choose between all the disciplines of the spiritual life, I would choose Bible memorization, because it is a fundamental way of filling our minds with what it needs. *This book of the law shall not depart out of your mouth*. That's where you need it! How does it get in your mouth? Memorization."

Sadly, the discipline of scripture memory has fallen on hard times and reflects the attitudes of our larger culture. We live in a time when memorization is routinely scorned. "Rote memory" and "rote learning," we are told, discourages creativity, critical thinking, and conceptual understanding. However, that thinking is totally at odds with reality. Is the creativity of an actor or musician crushed by the formidable feats of memory their art demand? Aaron Rodgers of the Green Bay Packers and Ben Roethlisberger of the Pittsburg Steelers will spend countless hours studying their opponents, memorizing defensive patterns, so that — in the midst of the action, when a 300-pound defensive lineman who runs like a cheetah and hits like a sledgehammer is bearing down on him — he will make the right decision in a split second largely without conscious intent or awareness, in large measure because of what he's memorized. What we put in our minds is of lasting importance. "Memorization of Scripture," Dallas Willard writes, "is one way of 'taking charge' of the content of our conscious thoughts, and of the feelings, beliefs, and actions that depend on them."

In his book *Scripture by Heart: Devotional Practices for Memorizing God's Word*, South Korean pastor Joshua Choonmin Kang writes, "The more we commit the Word to memory, the richer our being becomes. The melodious concert of His Word will continually echo within us. Then we'll encounter the conductor, our Lord Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, who helps us remember the Scriptures, and the Father, who'll receive glory through all of this."

Among the investments I've suggested we make for the New Year is the investment of scripture memory. Here are some practical ways to practice this discipline.

- 1. Meditate on the verse. Before you attempt to commit a verse to memory, you should meditate on it for a few minutes. Think about the meaning of the verse. How does it apply to your life? When have you obeyed or disobeyed this verse? Thinking over these things prior to memorizing will do two things. First, the verse will change you and make you more holy. Second, after meditating, you may already have the verse memorized without ever reciting it to yourself.
- **2. Recite the verse several times.** Read the entire verse to yourself several times. If it is a long verse, divide it and do this step in two parts. Recite the verse over and over until you can do it without looking. When reciting, always say the reference before the verse. This is an important step that will help you to remember which verses go with which references.
- **3. Review it daily for about two weeks.** If you are like me, you will have forgotten the verse one day later. This is normal. In order to remember it long-term, you must review it every day for about 2 weeks. After that, you can review it just once a week or once a month.

Steve and Ruth Porter's Visit; Upcoming Missions Conference

If you've ever wondered what life on a foreign mission field is like, you must have been enthralled while missionaries, **Steve and Ruth Porter**, updated us in a combined ABF hour on Sunday, January 23. Both Steve and Ruth gave us a glimpse of their last term in Miango, Nigeria, outlining their diverse ministry, which includes dentistry services for the locals as well as missionaries, a widows' ministry, discipleship and mentoring programs, and evangelism. They also related their heartbreaking loss of team-

mates and friends on the field as well as their frightening encounters with a group of armed robbers on their campus. They highlighted the fact that this year is an election year in Nigeria, and with elections comes unrest in the country at large. The government remains unstable in many ways and progress is constantly hampered by corruption. They reminded us how exciting and yet how precarious life on a foreign field can be. While there is no doubt their last term provided many reasons to lose hope, they did not. Instead, God has given them a vision to start another ministry to provide a respite for those who are struggling on the

field. The Porters plan to renovate a house there, in Miango, to accommodate missionaries who are in need of rest and recovery; a quiet place where they can regroup and respond to God's direction. They have discovered that a place of temporary retreat plays a vital role in the work that all the missionaries share together. We can identify with that, can't we? Even Christ himself left the crowds to seek solace in the presence of the Father. Let's remember the Porters in our prayers as they travel throughout the States

these next few months, and as they prepare to return to Nigeria for another term. If you missed their presentation, an audio CD maybe requested from the church office.

In the meantime, mark your calendars for March 25-27 and plan to attend all the events of this year's missions conference. Plan for ample time to learn more about the work the Lord is doing in the lives of Redeemer-supported missionaries as well as other ministries at home and abroad. Keep your eyes peeled for further details about the conference in bulletins, online and around the church campus.



Getting to Know You: Charles and Catherine L'Herisson

Catherine (Cathy) L'Herisson was born in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, shortly after her dad returned from serving in World War II, having been a Prisoner of War in China and Japan. Charles, born in Shreveport, also grew up in Louisiana. They both remember attending church with their families, and accepting Christ as Savior at an early age. Catherine elaborated, "My family moved to Corishatta, La., to be near my grandparents. Not long afterwards, when I was nine, my mom died of a brain tumor. Coincidentally, Charles also lost a parent, at the age of nine, when his dad died of a brain tumor."

Charles served in the army for three years after attending Jefferson Military Academy in Washington, Mississippi. He was working on his master's degree when he visited his older brother

who had become a doctor and set up a clinic in Corishatta, La. Charles shared, "On that particular Sunday, my niece came home, between Sunday School and Worship service, to change her torn stockings! She brought Catherine, her best friend, with her!" They began to date, and married in 1968, when Charles completed his master's degree. Cathy added, "We both still laugh about how I married my best friend's uncle!" The newlyweds moved to Dallas where Charles worked at Ford Motor, and then Texas Instruments (TI), for 29-1/2 years, until he retired. Their first child, Alisha, was born in 1970; their son, Monte, was born in 1975. During those years, Cathy was a homemaker, and did substitute teaching. She also participated in Craft fairs. Later she worked in the

Children's Cardiovascular Fitness Center at Presbyterian Hospital, and purchased equipment for the fitness center TI was building in Richardson. Finally, Cathy worked as a part-time Children's Director at Scofield, Reinhardt and Fire Wheel churches. In 2003 their faith was severely tested when Victoria, their only granddaughter, was diagnosed
