You can be a shepherd!

For many years these clay figures of two sheep with their shepherd carrying the lamb have adorned my desk. Crafted by Guatemalan Indians, they were given to me by our good friends Stan and Barbara Orth, life-long missionaries to Guatemala. More recently the clay figures have been joined by Ray North's delightfully creative wood carving, pictured on page one. Together, these shepherds and sheep serve as daily reminders of three important realities. I trust they will remind you as well. First and foremost, they remind us that The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want. Inexhaustible in its depth, that greatest and most beautiful of all Psalms, 23, goes on to describe the Shepherd's manifold provisions of our every need: rest and refreshment (v.2); restoration and guidance (v. 3); courage and protection (v.4); preservation, healing, and joy (v.5); goodness and mercy in this life and an eternity with the

This month in our worship services, in anticipation of commemorating and celebrating our Lord's death and resurrection, we will explore the meaning and depth of our Lord's statement in John 10:11 — *I am the good shep-herd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.* I'm calling it *The Good Shepherd Series.* To gain the most from our study and worship, I urge you — dare you — to read or quote

Psalm 23 each day in March and also read the Gospel of John, following our March reading guide. By month's end Psalm 23 will take on new meaning and will be forever and unforgettably ours. (I know: darers go first! Feel free to ask me along the way whether I'm following my own suggestion.)

Second, my little desk-top treasures also remind me that I too am called to be a shepherd. Actually, the word pastor means shepherd. We pastors, elders, ABF leaders, and others in similar positions take this calling and responsibility seriously and prayerfully. We conscientiously seek to obey Peter's charge to elders to be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care,

not because you must, but because you are willing, eager to serve, not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock (1 Peter 5:2ff) Please let us know how we, as Christ's undershepherds, may serve you or others you know.

Finally, our little shepherds hold just one more reminder for us all – we are all called to be shepherds, caring for each other in a wide variety of ways. A few of the many *one anothers* of the Bible suggest some of those

ways: be kind to one another, forgive, greet, love, in honor prefer, bear one another's burdens. We will explore this grand truth further in April, when in our worship services we will study the greatest how-to-live-the-Christian-life chapter of them all. Which chapter do you think it is?

It takes two metaphors to describe who we are and how we relate to both the Good Shepherd and to each other. Like sheep we follow the shepherd and trust him for all that is promised in our psalm of the month. Like shepherds we care for each other and those whom God sends our way.

In a word . . . we can be both sheep and shepherd!
