


Set Your Clocks Gorward

Missions Conference 2011: What in the World is God Doing?

Mark your calendars now for RBC's annual missions conference scheduled for March 25-27, and find out what the Lord is

doing around the world and in our own "backyard." As always, we will provide several opportunities for you to meet RBC missionaries and introduce you to new ways to get involved. We will kick off the weekend on Friday with dinners for 8/9 in homes throughout Dallas to fellowship, learn more about the current state of world missions, and engage in a time of prayer for the conference and for those who represent Christ on our behalf locally and abroad. On Saturday

night, come for a hamburger dinner provided by the men of Redeemer, followed by a message from founder of Gospel for Muslims, Dr. Abraham Sarker. Dr. Sarker was born and raised as a devout Muslim in Bangladesh and was being trained as an Islamic leader when he encountered the good news of Christ, and accepted Jesus as his Savior. God has since used him to lead Muslims to Christ, including members of his own family, who initially disowned him when he accepted Jesus. You will not want to miss Dr. Sarker as he shares his passion for reaching Muslims around the world with the gospel and how we too can understand and reach out to Muslim people! On Sunday morning we will have five missions-focused electives to choose from during the ABF hour. First, Dave Owen, President of Pacific Islands University, will update us with a first-hand report from Guam concerning life on campus, what the Lord is doing in the lives of the students there, and ways to pray for them. Second, Redeemer missionaries, Jonathan and Barbara Baker will share news from

Pachuca, Mexico and their journeys stateside. Third, a representative from **Voice of the Martyrs** will discuss the persecuted church

around the world and some ways we can get involved and help our brothers and sisters in Christ, who are faithfully serving the Savior in troubled times. Fourth, our own **Kristen Raikes** will share about her exciting partnership with OMF and their vision for ministry for the Shan people in Thailand. Fifth, former Muslim and current follower of Christ, **Safeeya Schnaufer** of Gospel for Muslims, will talk about how she came to Christ

and her passion for sharing the good news of Jesus with Muslims.

Sunday morning will conclude with a message from Dave Owen, President of Pacific Islands University. Since 1976, PIU has been preparing men and women to serve Jesus Christ in Micronesia and throughout the world. The vision of PIU is to be a leader throughout Guam, Micronesia, and the Pacific Region in providing accessible, transformational and quality Christian higher education that will prepare men and women with a biblical worldview for leadership and service in life, work, and ministry in the global community and the church. PIU brings together students from many different countries and many religious denominations, so that no matter which "island" you come from, you can experience the many cultures of the world in a small-school environment where students, staff and faculty know each other and can develop close relationships. We are happy to have Dave back at Redeemer and we look forward to hearing from him during this year's conference.

Grom the Pastor's Pen Heart Surgery and the Lord's Table

Dr. Samuel Weinstein is the chief pediatric cardiothoracic surgeon for the Montefiore Medical Center in the Bronx, New York. In May 2006, he traveled to El Salvador with Heart Care International in order to provide life-saving operations for needy children. Francisco Calderon Anthony Fernandez was an eight year old with a failing aortic valve that was to be replaced with his pulmonary valve and the pulmonary valve was replaced with an artificial valve.

Dr. Weinstein and his team began operating on Francisco's heart shortly before noon and twelve hours later the operation took a deadly turn. "The surgery had been going well, everything was working great, but he was bleeding a lot and they didn't have a lot of the medicines we would use to stop the bleeding," Weinstein said. "After a while, they said they couldn't give him blood because they were running out and he had a rare type." In fact, Francisco's blood type was B-negative, which only two percent of people have.

As it was, the only other person in the room with a bloodtype of B-negative was Dr. Weinstein. Knowing what he had to do, he stepped down from the operating table as his colleagues continued their precision work; Dr. Weinstein set aside his scalpel, took off his gloves, and began washing his hands and forearms. Then, in the corner of an unfamiliar operating room, the prestigious doctor from one of the most advanced hospitals in the world sat down and gave away his own blood.

When he had given his pint, Dr. Weinstein drank some bottled water and ate a Pop-Tart. Then -20 minutes after stepping away from the table - he rejoined his colleges. After watching his own blood begin circulating into the boys small veins, Dr. Weinstein completed the operation that saved Francisco's heart – and his life.

"It was a little bit surreal, Weinstein said. "We don't sleep a lot, we don't eat a lot, and we were working very hard, and here it was 11 o'clock at night and they hung my blood and he was getting my blood."

The patient, Francisco, came off the ventilator the next day and had some lunch with Weinstein and later returned to his home in El Salvador.

"His mother was very happy with me and she said to me, "Does this mean that he's going to grow up and become an American doctor?""

In a similar way, the blood of Jesus Christ provides for us another chance at life. Peter says "For you know that it was not with perishable things such as silver or gold that you were redeemed from the empty way of life handed down to you from your ancestors, but with the precious blood of Christ, a lamb without blemish or defect" (1 Peter 1:18-19).

In my opinion, there is no higher, more meaningful or more important time of worship than our gathering around the Lord's Table to remember the sacrifice of Jesus Christ. Jesus took from the last meaningful Passover two elements to remember Him. The bread would symbolize his body and the cup his blood. Our tradition at RBC is to observe this ordinance on the first Sunday of the month. Of all the Sunday's of the month, this one needs to be a priority. I encourage you to make it a priority of your worship and fellowship here at RBC.

Summer Missions Opportunities to Consider

It's that time of year again! It's time for you to consider participating in one of Redeemer's summer mission trips. Consider how the Lord might use you to minister to various people around the world in the areas of evangelism, discipleship, teaching, serving, and coaching. This summer we will be representing the Lord around the globe: Asia, Europe and Central America.

Asia

Journey to the Philippines with a group headed by **Dr. Larry Waters**, who has a long-standing relationship with missionaries there. You'll spend time in evangelism, discipleship and ministering to the needs of the locals.

Europe

A team will also head to the Word of Life campus in Hungary again, to partner with Redeemer-supported missionaries, **Laci and Szandra Kadar**. The team will help with the summer camp program teaching English and baseball skills to teenagers from all over the country. Many of the teens who attend have never heard the good news of Jesus Christ. Like Dr. Waters's ministry with the group in the Philippines, this is a well-established ministry that thrives on the help they receive through short-term mission teams like ours.

Central America

Finally, there will also be a team headed to rural parts of Guatemala to install efficient wood-burning stoves to needy people in remote areas. These wood-burning stoves significantly decrease the toxic emissions from indoor fire pits that are typically used to cook family meals. In fact, these durable stoves also minimize smoke and burns, and reduce wood use by 70%, lowering the rate of deforestation. For the Mayan recipients, these stoves have been an invaluable addition to their homes and physical symbol of the love brought to them through caring Christians like you.
