On March 4 RBC will host The Flutes of the Spirit during our morning worship service. The Flutes of the Sprit is a group of Christian flutists who delight in serving God with their music. Now in its twelfth year, the members range in age from high school students to senior citizens. Their diverse vocations include business, teaching, lab technician and mothering small children and grandchildren. They have played in hospitals, senior citizen homes, prisons, for weddings, funerals, club organizations, as well as in churches that honor Jesus Christ.

### 2012 Missions Conference Involvement in missions is possible for all of us

Redeemer's annual Missions Conference will encourage each of us to get involved in God's work here in Dallas and around the world.

Two keynote speakers will challenge us to get out of our comfort zones:

Celestin Musekura, president and

founder of Dallasbased African Leadership and Reconciliation Ministries, will speak at the special missions service on Saturday evening, March 24. Celestin, previously a pastor from Rwanda, lost many members of his family and church

in the tragic genocide that took the lives of more than 1 million people in his home country during the 1990s. He later earned master's and doctorate degrees from Dallas Theological Seminary and began a thriving ministry that focuses on reconciliation and forgiveness, leadership development, and community transformation in eight countries

in east and central Africa. Among many other ministries, ALARM trains pastors from countries such as Congo, South Sudan, Uganda and Rwanda. He will speak about what our response as Christians should be to global human needs.

Laci Kadar, of Word of Life Hungary,

will be the guest speaker during the morning worship service on Sunday, March 25. Laci and his wife, Szandra, were members at Redeemer during the years that he attended Dallas Theological Seminary. Laci

began his association with WOL in 1991 as a camp counselor and joined the staff full time in 1995 as director of a camping ministry that serves about 1,000 children each summer. The camp uses sports and language instruction to reach Hungarian youth with

# From the Pastor's Pen

## Accepted in the Beloved

"He hath made us accepted in the beloved" (Eph. 1:6 KJV).

Years ago the great Bible teacher Harry A. Ironside was preaching in the small town of Roosevelt, Washington, on the north bank of the Columbia River. He was the guest of friends who were sheep-raisers. It was lambing time and every morning Dr. Ironside along with his guests went to see the hundreds of lambs playing on the green hillside. One morning Dr. Ironside was startled to see an old ewe loping across the road, followed by the strangest looking lamb. It apparently had six legs, and the last two were hanging helpless as though paralyzed. The skin seemed to be partially torn from its body in a way that made the little lamb look as though it were suffering terribly.

Dr. Ironside inquired of his host why the lamb looked so different and the mystery was quickly explained. That lamb did not originally belong to that ewe. She had a lamb which was bitten by a rattlesnake and died. This lamb that I saw was an orphan and needed a mother's care. At first the bereft ewe refused to have anything to do with it. She sniffed at it when it was brought to her, then pushed it away, saying as plainly as a sheep could say it, "This is not our family odor!" So the herders skinned the lamb that had died and very carefully drew the fleece over the living lamb. This left the hind-leg covering dragging loose. When covered, the lamb was brought again to

the ewe. She smelled it once more and this time seemed thoroughly satisfied and adopted it as her own.

Dr. Ironside suggested that this is a beautiful picture of the grace of God to the sinner. We are all outcasts and have no claim upon His love. But God's own Son, the "Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the World," has died for us and now we who believe are dressed up in the fleece of the Lamb who died. Thus, God has accepted us in Him, and "there is therefore now no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus." We are as dear to the heart of the Father as His own holy, spotless Son.

The hymn-writer was correct when he wrote:

"So dear, so very dear to God,
More dear I cannot be:
The love wherewith He loves His Son,
Such is His love to me.
So near, so very near to God,
Nearer I could not be,
For in the person of His Son,
I am as near as He."

As we approach our missions weekend at the end of this month (March 23-25), may I remind us all that our task is to share the good news that brings people who are orphaned into God's family. Those outside can be brought inside by trusting in Jesus Christ's death and resurrection for them. That truth ought to cause us to be grateful because we are accepted and motivate us to tell others.

- Work in close association with the Senior Pastor in developing and implementing a strategy for outreach and growth.
- Work in close association with the entire staff to build and maintain a strong team environment among our staff and

- complete the work necessary to fully serve and support the ministries and events of Redeemer Bible Church.
- Attend regular staff meetings and participate in additional meetings when requested to do so.
- Cooperate with the Senior Pastor by performing any other duties as requested.


