In a Word

If it's there, do it!

For many years we heard and read about a charming town near a mysterious lake in east Texas. For all those years we said, "Some day we've got to visit Jefferson and Caddo Lake." Finally, needing to take a break and slow down a bit, we heeded a saying on my study wall: If it's there, do it! So we did it. Since we enjoy small towns and roads less traveled, we began the "slow down" part by heading east on highway 276 to Quinlan and Tawakoni, then 69 to Alba, and 154 to Gilmer, Diana, and Harletan. Lunch at a local Mexican café was small-town relaxed and delicious. After those earlier welcome rains, the east Texas countryside was at its springtime best - clean and green, with the promise of bluebonnets and Indian paint brushes to come. Highways 2208 and 59 took us on to Jefferson, which, as several of you have described, is charming and historic, and which embraces its storied past while continuing to thrive. Our Jefferson home for two nights, the McKay House, was built in 1850 and was renovated as a bedand-breakfast by our own Tom and Peggy Taylor. Its squeaky pine floors, high ceilings (14'), and beautiful-but-sturdy 19th century furniture and décor all worked their magic. A delicious dinner and evening stroll through nearby downtown made our day complete.

We spent the next day on and around Caddo Lake, the only natural lake in Texas. One hundred years ago large steam-powered paddle wheel vessels carried cotton, grain, and other commercial cargo from Caddo Lake down navigable rivers all the way to New Orleans. Today the lake is shallow and filled with large Spanish moss-laden cypress trees, a true fisherman's paradise. The day's highlight was a cruise through the cypress forest on an authentic wood-fueled, steam-powered paddle wheeler, its only sound the soothing, rhythmic *shush* of releasing steam. Our transport to a slower, more relaxed time was complete. A second quiet night was punctuated only by the soothing rumble of passing freight trains. A gourmet breakfast, five more highways, and ten more towns, and we were home again, relaxed, refreshed and rarin' to go.

My purpose in telling you all this is not to entice you to visit Jefferson, though it really is a trip worth taking (so much more to see and do than I described). My two points are suggested in the preceding paragraphs. If you get them before reading on, I'll buy you a cold drink or a cup of coffee.

The first and most obvious point concerns that special event or trip you've always talked about, wanted to take, the one that's worth doing and within your means. Do it! Take it! Set a time, make your plans, save your money. If it's there to be done, do it. Let's not have John Greenleaf Whittier's poignant words be true of us: "For all sad words of tongue and pen, The saddest are these: it might have been." *If it's there, do it!*

The second is often related to the first: It concerns staying fresh for the long haul. The pressures of our fast-paced, highstress times require many to work longer hours under more stress than ever before. Spiritual, emotional, and physical burnout happens when we work too hard, under too much stress, for too a long a period. Taking a break and unloading the stress, whether for a few days or a few hours, go a long way in helping us stay fresh for the long haul. More about that next month.

Meanwhile, I'd enjoy a cup of coffee or a Coke with you, whether or not you guessed my points. Just give me a call.

In a word, if it's there, do it! It'll help keep you fresh for the long haul.
