# Missions Conference Challenged us to Reach the World For Christ

Redeemer's annual missions conference — with a theme of "Missions: Possible" was held March 23-25 and provided opportunities to learn more about what God is doing in our city and around the world.

In addition to great opportunities for fellowship, interaction and learning, Redeemer

members raised about \$5,000 for two special projects during the conference. We will provide funds for **Kristen Raikes** to buy a motorbike so she can minister more effectively in northern Thailand, and we will provide scholarships for Hungarian youth to attend the Word of Life camp where we have partnered for more than 10 years.

#### Friday Night Dinners

The "Dinners for 8 or 9" potlucks were held Friday evening, March 23, in eight homes. These dinners combined fellowship, missions and prayer to encourage and connect Redeemer members with those taking God's salvation to the ends of the earth.

#### Saturday Night Speaker

On Saturday, March 24, we heard from Dr. Celestin Musekura, a Dallas Seminary graduate and global leader in reconciliation and forgiveness. He founded African Leadership and Reconciliation Ministries after members of his family and church were murdered in the Rwandan genocide. Dr. Musekura delivered a powerful message entitled "The Christian Response to Global Needs," exhorting those of us in America to recognize our responsibilities, roles and



opportunities to join God's work amidst global suffering and need. His penetrating message is on the Redeemer website.

#### Sunday Morning Speaker

A wonderful worship message on Sunday, March 25, was delivered by Laci

Kadar, a former member of Redeemer who serves with Word of Life Hungary. His message — "Missions? Possible!" — asked how we can better serve God. He expounded upon Exodus 19:1-6 and 2 Peter 2:9-12, declaring missions are possible when Christians respond in obedience. Christ's message is powerful because it stands in such contrast with "the lost

## **Grom the Elder Board** Blessed, Thankful and Confident

Redeemer Bible Church is blessed. Since our founding 13 years ago, God has clearly led our congregation each step of our journey. He's brought wonderful people to the church. He provided a campus that is perfect for our needs. We benefit from strong leaders and hard-working volunteers. Most important, the congregation is full of prayer warriors. And He is continuing to lead us today, even as we trust Him again to bring us a new senior pastor. Here's why we, as an Elder Board, are so optimistic about our church's future:

- Redeemer is a congregation of spiritually mature, positive, hopeful believers.
- We have a terrific staff and godly, mature leaders. Every member of the staff, along with many volunteers, pitches in every week to support our church and its people. For example, in the absence of a worship pastor, a number of people have stepped up to help plan our worship services.
- Every decision is bathed in prayer.
- We have a great lineup of interim preachers. We are very fortunate that our founding pastor, **Don Geiger Sr.**, agreed to serve as our primary interim preacher. He will preach, on average, about three Sundays out of four. He currently is preaching a series through the book of Philippians. Other guest preachers will fill the pulpit when he's out.
- Even in the midst of uncertainty about who our next senior pastor will be, our Sunday morning worship services are well-attended and we are meeting our financial obligations.

#### Search Committee

Additionally, as a result of Pastor Doug Hornok's resignation in March, the Elder Board recently appointed a pastoral search committee. The committee has just begun taking the initial

steps in a search process that will identify a candidate to be our new senior pastor. The committee is chaired by **Scott Shaffer**, a member of the Elder Board. The team also includes: **Ann Fleming**, **Don Geiger Jr.**, **Brad Hepp**, **Tom Newcomer**, **John Rack**, **Debbie Raikes** and **Lillian Rees**.

This committee will conduct a thorough search, which likely will include considering individuals we know might be interested and others referred by people in our congregation, reaching out to Dallas Seminary and possibly other schools for recommendations, and advertising in appropriate venues. The committee will review resumes, listen to lots of sermons, visit other churches, conduct interviews, explore backgrounds and check references thoroughly.

Ultimately, the committee will narrow the list of candidates to one individual and recommend that person to the Board of Elders for consideration. The board will conduct its own interviews, and, if it agrees with the recommendation, will recommend the candidate to the entire membership for consideration. The candidate will preach and will have plenty of opportunities to visit with members and various groups in the church. Members will have the ultimate decision by voting at a business meeting whether to call the candidate as our pastor.

This likely will be a long process, so please be patient. We don't know how much time it will take, but it's not unusual for a search process to last up to a year.

#### Looking ahead

We are thankful for Redeemer. We as a board and as individuals pray regularly for our church and its people, and we know that many of you do the same. Thank you!

We are confident in God's provision for us and in His plan for our future.

This year's annual Redeemer Workday (April 28) drew approximately seventy volunteers, who worked all over the campus, tending to the flower beds, cleaning furniture, toys, windows, floors, and removing clutter.



## Getting to Know You: Howard and Fran Joslin

Howard and Fran Joslin lost their spouses to cancer, only two months apart, in 2008.

"In the mist of our paralyzing grief, the Lord surprised Howard and me with the gift of each other," Fran said. "In 2010, He gave us something we never thought possible — the blessing of falling in love again."

Their relationship began when a close friend told Howard about a widow who was experiencing his same, devastating grief. He sent her his favorite book on grief, *A Grace Disguised.* They soon met.

Fran was born in Papua, Indonesia, to missionary parents. "I loved climbing the mountains in bare feet, as the tribes to which my parents ministered did not wear shoes," she said. When she was

3, Fran heard her sister preach "hellfire and brimstone." Fran ran to her mom, who better explained the Gospel message, to which she immediately responded by accepting Christ. Fran's family left the mission field when she was 12, and she always considered herself a "third-culture kid." After Fran's father died in 2006, her mother published his journals as a book, *A Missionary's Journal*, which is in Redeemer's church library.

Howard, with his brother and sister, grew up on his grandfather's farm in central Iowa.

"When I was 16, my mom and dad separated, and divorced on their 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary," he said. "Granddad was my primary father, and taught me humor, honesty and hard work through his example." Howard accepted Christ his senior year in high school after hearing a speaker from the Gideon Bible Society. Going on a mission project to Japan during college gave him
