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In a Word

Let's Imitate Christ

In recent days we've all been shocked — stunned — at yet another senseless, murderous campus rampage that killed thirtythree students and faculty, including the assailant himself, and left another twenty-four wounded on the Virginia Tech campus. We pray for and grieve with broken-hearted families, friends, and classmates. We are moved by and admire the selfless courage of 76-year-old Holocaust survivor and faculty member, Professor Liviu Librescu, who used his body to block the door to his classroom, so his students could escape with their lives. He gave his life that they might live. We wonder what we might have done and pray that if the occasion arises, we will exhibit that same selfless courage. We are heartened to see the student body rally around the grieving and come together in mutual support of each other. We pray for fellow believers on campus and those otherwise connected with the university as they find opportunity to share the love of Jesus Christ in appropriate and effective ways. We wonder what might have been different had someone reached out to Cho Seung-Hui in a serious attempt to befriend him and share the love of Christ. Indeed, perhaps someone did.

Those of us old enough to remember are reminded all too vividly of the massacre on the U T Austin campus just 40 years ago, when a sniper murdered 16, shooting from atop the campus clock tower. Then we recall other fatal campus shootings — 32 separate instances in the United States just in the past ten years. The overwhelming majority of the assailants were teenage students, some as young as 11–14 years old.

Then come the questions. What, if anything, could have

been done to prevent these tragedies? Why does God allow them? Could he prevent them if he chooses? Does it mean our schools are no longer safe for our children and grandchildren? Has our country gone completely to the dogs? The philosophical among us push the question farther, asking why there must be *any* suffering, be it mayhem on a college campus, or disease and death that we *all* experience. Good questions, all, but there are no easy answers.

I am reminded of a saying (now hanging on my study wall) my college president, Dr. V. Raymond Edman, taught us many years ago: *Never doubt in the dark what God has shown you in the light.* Without attempting answers to these weighty questions in this brief space, I find it helpful to remember a few things God has shown us in his Word.

- 1. We live in a sinful, fallen world in which God allows us to make our own choices. From Cain's choice to murder his brother Abel, history is littered with horrific choices. The wages of sin are still sorrow, tragedy, and death, even in America.
- 2. God can and in his timing will put an end to all injustice and evil. Paradoxical as it may seem, it is God's patience, love, and grace that delay his return and final judgment, in order that more may hear the gospel, believe, and be saved. In answering scoffers' questions about God's role in the world, or lack thereof, Peter explained his seeming delay with these words: *God is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance.* (2 Peter 3:9).
- 3. Twelve times in the Gospels we read that, when Jesus saw hurting, grieving, desperate people, he was moved with compassion. Inevitably, he reached out to love them and meet their needs. Then he would say to his disciples, *Follow me!* We don't have all the answers, or even most of them; but this most recent tragedy can be a reminder to us to be imitators of Christ in his compassion for hurting people.

In a word . . . let's imitate Christ!
