On Sunday, April 20, Redeemer welcomed the Gideons, who gave an excellent presentation and report of their ministry both in America and around the world in 180 countries. Gideons International is a volunteer organization that distributes millions of Bibles each year. At the end of the worship service, our Redeemer Gideons received an offering totaling \$1,976, enough money to place 1,464 testaments into the hands of school children or to place 395 Bibles in hotel rooms! God Loves Refugees

When **Kristen Raikes** graduated from college (John Brown) and moved back to Dallas, her heart for international people guided her to work with refugees. A summer internship with Friends of Refugees in Atlanta had put the "bug" in her for this

kind of outreach. Refugee Resources, Inc. directed her to several Karen refugees living in Garland. At least once a week, Kristen teaches English to a motivated group of 10 to 25 of these refu-



gees from Burma. Her "schoolhouse" is the small apartment of one Karen family (those of us who attended the Eggstravaganza got to meet the eight children of that family, pictured above). Kristen emphasizes that "anyone can work with refugees. You don't need a college education or specialty in ESL. Refugees just need a friend, just like anyone."

Bob and Becky met in a singles class at Reinhardt Bible Church in 1978. Bob reported, "After only three weeks, I asked

Bob and Becky were born in Bakersfield, California and McKinney, Texas respectively. Bob attended kindergarten through 12th grades in California, Texas, and Florida! Becky moved all over the country until she was ten years old. She explained, "My dad was in the oil business and my mom

was an artist. Whenever dad had to move, we gladly went with him; otherwise, I never would have known him! Consequently, we lived in trailers and I attended twelve elementary schools, two junior highs and one high school." Becky's family settled in the Dallas/Fort Worth area in 1960. Her parents still live here.

Days before beginning college at the University of Wyoming, Bob accepted Christ as his Savior. Being a new Christian, he was greatly influenced by students associated with Navigators and Campus Crusade who encouraged him to attend retreats at Glen Eyrie in Colorado. Bob's computer career began after he joined the U.S. Air Force and moved to Minneapolis. He

joined a church which sponsored special meetings led by Dallas Theological Seminarians Drs. Walvoord, Hendricks and Ryrie. Bob decided to attend DTS and moved to Dallas in 1973.

Becky received Christ as her Savior at the age of six. She recalled, "Ricky, age eight, led me to the Lord.

Because of my family travels, I did not find a great church until I moved to Dallas and started attending Reinhardt Bible Church in 1973. Bob and I started singing in the

> choir at Reinhardt in 1978. Now we sing in the Redeemer choir." Becky also plays handbells and has joined The Flutes of the Spirit. She has many other talents including fashion, quilting, crocheting, and building dollhouses. She recently finished building her second dollhouse! She and Bob enjoy genealogical searches and have made several research

trips. They plan to write their own family history book someday.

Becky applied for and received a Texas Historical Marker for a cemetery in Farmersville, TX, where her great-grandparents are buried. They received the marker last spring and dedicated it in October, 2007. Becky was also invited to join the Daughters of the American Revolution after proving her lineage to Joseph Hardin, a Revolutionary War participant.
