From the Pastor's Pen 37 and counting

The Bible is clear that we are not to live our lives looking back, but rather looking forward. Paul said: "One thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:13-14).

This principle, however, does not mean that we should avoid reflection on significant events in our lives. The Lord's Table is a perfect symbol of our reflection on the sacrifice of our Lord Jesus Christ. I remember vividly the night I put my faith in him — changing my life forever.

The second most significant day was when I married my lovely wife Connie. Thirty seven years ago this month Connie and I became husband and wife at the Berachah Bible Baptist Church in Bridgeton NJ. As I write this, I can say without hesitation that there is no person I'd rather spend my time with than my wife — she has been an absolute joy!

In 37 years of marriage God has taught me a great deal. First, the absolute necessity of commitment. I took a vow before God, Connie, my family and friends that I would be faithful and loving to Connie "till death do us part." It was a life-long commitment. May I firmly, yet lovingly, remind you that God takes serious the vows we make before Him and others.

Second, I've learned that love is a decision of the will and not an emotion. Shortly after I met Connie's maternal grandmother, she gave me a definition of love: "love is such a funny thing, it's like a little lizard. It wraps it's tail around your heart, and sticks you in the gizzard." At the time, that definition was right on target. I was madly and head over heels in love! I had those warm wonderful feelings that come from being in love and desiring to be with that person. And yet, as great and wonderful as those feelings are, they cannot sustain marriage. What sustains our marriage is a conscious, consistent decision to love one another.

Third, I've learned the need for communication. Communication comes in two forms: verbal and non-verbal. I love the story of the husband and wife who hadn't talked in weeks. They were driving down a country road and past a farm where there were some donkeys in the pasture. The husband looked at his wife and spoke for the first time in weeks: "Some of your relatives?" The wife was more than equal to the occasion in her response. "As a matter of fact yes, on my husband's side!" As a husband, I've learned I have to listen. When Connie needs an ear, I have to be there and that requires carving out time from very busy schedules to just talk.

Fourth, I've learned the reality that compatibility does not demand uniformity. Just because we have different likes and dislikes does not mean we can't make our marriage work. Thank God we are all different and unique!

Finally, I've learned to focus more on *my* role in the marriage and less on my wife's. My function in the marriage is to "love my wife as Christ loved the Church" (Eph. 5:25), not to be harsh, to live with her in an understanding way and to grant her honor (1 Peter 3:7). The more I focus on *my* role, and fulfill it, the easier it is for Connie to function in hers.

Connie I love you! Thank you for 37 wonderful years.

Getting to Know You: Corky and Sandy Bridgman

Bright smiles, great personalities, and a genuine love for everyone are well known characteristics of **Corky & Sandy Bridgman**.

When he was born in Baylor hospital, Corky's parents, Charles and Carrie Bridgman, named him Harold Bynum. However, an aunt dubbed him 'Corky,' which stuck throughout the years! Corky shared, "I had one older brother who endured spina bifida and polio. Sadly, he died when he was nineteen." Sandy grew up in the Goodlett community (10 miles west of Quanah, TX.) She graduated from Quanah high school as salutatorian and "Most Likely to Succeed."

Both graduated from North Texas

State University (NT), although Corky attended Southern Methodist University his freshman year on a track scholarship. Active and popular in college, Corky was a cheerleader for two years, and initiated Theta Chi Fraternity; while Sandy was a member of scholastic organizations, and Chi Omega Sorority. Sandy remembered, "When I was a freshman, a friend arranged a blind date with Corky, who was a senior! We went to a dance at the Adolphus Hotel, but only two dates followed! Little did I know we would be married someday!" Corky graduated May, 1952 with a degree in advertising. He then joined the Navy for two years before starting his advertising career, in Dallas. Upon earning a Business Education degree, Sandy moved to Dallas in 1955. She laughingly related, "I *ran into* Corky one day, as surprisingly, his office was located around the corner!" She

continued, "This time, we dated seriously, and the rest is history!" They were married in

January, 1957 at Lakewood Methodist,

Corky's home church. Corky shared, "Sandy was saved as a child, while attending a revival. I accepted Christ, in high school at a Young Life (YL) meeting. When our son, Shawn, and daughter, Camille, were in high school, Sandy and I served on a YL committee." Sandy added, "We sponsored a YL ski trip to

Winter Park, Colorado and Corky got caught in a snow storm, on top of the mountain! Eventually, he got back to the lodge, frozen mustache and all, but he had never skied before, and

never did again!" Sandy continued, "Thankfully, all of our family, including nine grandchildren, are believers. We have traveled and known good times, but we have also known hard times. Camille almost died at birth, Corky had a life threatening head injury in 1995, and we lost our son-in-law, Greg Millet, in 2009, but our faith in God has sustained us." Before joining Redeemer, Corky and Sandy served at Fellowship Bible Church for 20 years. Corky reported, "Looking for a smaller church, and having the opportunity to worship with our son's family, we joined Redeemer. He continued, "We love the teaching, and the people, and we enjoy the encouragement to share our joys and sorrows in the Seekers Adult Bible Fellowship." We are thankful for Sandy and Corky, and for their unwavering faith, and ability to love, laugh and live in God's care and grace.


