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From the Pastor's Pen

Unintended consequences

As part of our wedding anniversary celebration (38 years) and attending my 40th High School class reunion, Connie and I were able to visit one of our favorite places, Moab, Utah. This small town in Southern Utah is at the heart of two national parks, Arches and Canyonlands and a state park known as Dead Horse Point. The Colorado River runs through Canyonlands and the 2000 feet red rock canyons provide some of the most spectacular scenery in all the world. If you've never traveled there, it needs to be on your "places to visit" list. You will not be disappointed. Let me show you the pictures sometime.

During our visit to Moab I learned something new. More than 100 years ago in an effort to prevent erosion and stabilize river banks, scientists introduced eight different species of trees known as the Tamarisk. The Tamarisk tree (also known as salt cedar) was an invasive non-native plant that reproduced rapidly and grows along the rivers in Europe and Asia. Tamarisk can grow as high as 25 feet tall and each plant can produce as many as 500,000 seeds annually. Through the years these seeds have been dispersed by wind, water and animals until today the entire banks of the Colorado River are covered with Tamarisk trees from Colorado to California. What's more, these trees are now throughout the southwest area of the United States. There are, however, several problems — several unintended consequences — that the scientists never anticipated. First, the erosion that the scientists believed was happening along the Colorado River was not nearly as great as first thought. In fact, erosion is needed to keep a river healthy. When the water runs high and fast during the spring from snow melt it removes debris, flushes alkaline

from the soil and prevents sand bars from developing which impede the river's flow. Second, these trees produce a dense, nearly impenetrable thicket that is narrowing the flow of the river. Third, and of much greater concern, the Tamarisks that line the thousands of miles of shoreline of the Colorado River are consuming precious water. Mature Tamarisk trees can uptake nearly 200 gallons of water a day from the river. Some scientists estimate that as much as one third of the Colorado River's water is consumed by these millions of trees. It is estimated that the West is losing enough water to supply more than 20 million people with water for one year or to irrigate over one million acres of land. What started out as a good intention has become a serious problem.

Because water is such a precious commodity for survival, scientists in 2001 introduced a beetle from Kazakhstan that is eating the Tamarisk trees in the hopes that over time this tiny beetle will eradicate the Tamarisk tree. Only time will tell if there are some *other* "unintended consequences" from the introduction of beetles into the eco-system. Who knows, perhaps in a few years scientists will be trying to eradicate the beetle!

As I learned what was happening along the Colorado River, I was reminded again of Paul's words in Galatians 6: "Do not be deceived, God is not mocked, whatever a man sows, that shall he also reap." Every choice we make, word we speak, action we engage in has consequences. Sometimes they are obvious, other times they are not. Let's make certain that what we do does not come back to haunt us. Consequences can last for generations!

Missions Minded

It's summertime in Texas and that means short-term missions trips are underway! By the time you read this, **Steve Paris**, **Kay Paris**, **Leonard Rees**, **Charlane Rack** and **Rebecca Rack** will have taken to the skies en route to Guatemala to bring

wood-burning stoves to rural Mayans (6/25-7/3). They are working hard to install efficient wood-burning stoves for needy people in remote areas to decrease the toxic emissions from indoor fire pits that are typically used to cook family meals. These durable stoves also minimize smoke and burns, and reduce wood use by 70%, lowering the rate of deforestation. For the Mayan, these stoves have been an invaluable addition to their homes and physical symbol of the love brought to them by our faithful team.

Next, **Dr. Larry** and **Mary Waters** will lead a team including **Doug Hornok**, **Connie Hornok** and **Ann Rodgers** to the Philippines. They will join missionaries there and spend time in evangelism, discipleship and ministering to the needs of the

locals. They depart for the Philippines on July 7 and will return on July 19.

A final team, including Janet Ramler, Kevin Ramler, Andrew Ramler, Michaella (Ruffino) Ramler, Laura

Blomstedt, Edward Matthews,
Laramie Sage, Emma Wade, Charlie
Reibenstein and Byron Donaho will
head to Hungary to minister to the
youth summer camp at the Word of
Life campus. They will partner with
our Redeemer-supported missionaries,
Laci and Szandra Kadar, teaching
English and baseball skills to teenagers
from all over the country. Many of the
teens who attend have never heard the
good news of Jesus Christ. Like Dr.
Waters' ministry with the group in the
Philippines, this is a well-established

ministry that thrives on the help they receive through short-term mission teams like these. Let's keep these teams in our prayers throughout the summer — that they will be faithful and effective ministers of the gospel of Jesus Christ for the glory of God.
