The Truth Project Examines Science, History During July

Redeemer's Summer Fellowship Series is under way. Join us Wednesdays at 6 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall for The Truth Project, a Christian worldview tour facilitated by Bert Howard, a member of the pastoral staff. Topics for July include:

Science: what is true? The battle for truth

rages on, and this stop on the tour will address questions such as: Where did the cosmos come from? Is there a creator or is it all a cosmic accident? Is science honest investigation or a vehicle for godless philosophy? What do we hear from the heavens? What happens when God is left out?

• History: whose story? This topic will explore questions such as: Is the meaning of history truly God's story? Does the past have objective actuality and significance? What hollow and deceptive lies have we believed? Why is remembering so important?

Where the Cupboard's Never Bare

Redeemer member **Sonja Rose** watched a long, steady miracle unfold for 18 years as she managed the Dallas Theological Seminary ministry called Luke's Pantry.

Luke's Pantry provides food to enrolled students who temporarily lack the resources to provide food for their family. The ministry is solely supported by donations and volunteers. For 18 years, before retiring this April from the volunteer manager position, Sonja watched the Lord provide time and time again. And He didn't just provide the food Luke's Pantry gives out.

The Lord provided just the right amount of volunteers and the right amount of funds – all at just the right time. Sonja started in 1994 when

she and a friend, **Shirley Porterfield**, found what was then called "the Food Basket," a 5-year-old ministry started by Beatta "Bea" Campbell, late wife of then-president Donald Campbell. When then-manager Doris Wittmer asked Shirley and her to take it over, they prayed through it together and stepped in. The hairstyles, families and volunteers changed over time: Shirley stepped down as co-chair, the ministry moved buildings and name changed to Luke's Pantry.

The one thing that never changed: God's providence.

"I never cease to be amazed at how it keeps operating all these years," Sonja said.

Some years, Luke's Pantry served 200 families a week – and the Lord met the food needs and provided about 40 volunteers. In the last year, they served 160-170 families a week, with



enough volunteers to match.

Donors and churches across the Dallas-Fort Worth area continue to fill the pantry. Christian businessmen, families on a monthly schedule and generous individuals on an occasional schedule make regular donations of funds or food. And Sonja continues to volunteer with her husband. Don.

Redeemer takes a collection of nonperishable food the first Sunday of each month. Collection bins are

in the lobby by the playground entrance, but Sonja still collects for Luke's Pantry, too. Monetary donations are used to purchase groceries for the pantry. Checks should be made out to DTS and noted for Luke's Pantry. Financial donations are tax-deductible.

Ministries, which focuses on overseas evangelism, church planting and training church leaders. One way it accomplishes these goals is through shortterm mission trips.

"I have been on two such trips with my dad, which proved to be very memorable experiences," he said. "Both trips — first to Russia and then to Cuba — included door-to-door evangelism. I had always heard of people being changed dramatically by the gospel, but this ministry enabled me to see it firsthand."

Colin became a member of Redeemer in 2009. He is the Young Adult Bible Fellowship class leader and has participated in Sundaymorning Scripture reading.

"My time at Redeemer has been one of great spiritual growth," he said. "Although I have always attended church, I never got as involved as I have at Redeemer. People at our church are so

friendly and welcoming, and more importantly the church teaches and preaches from God's Word."
