- GriefShare is a needed resource of support that features biblical teaching on grief and recovery topics. Class discussions and sharing are sparked by interaction with



In a Word

It's time for a fresh start!

To me, September is a special month; it brings with it the hope that the steamy dog days of late summer will soon be over. Those best-of-Texas seasons — fall, winter, spring — now stretch before us. The kids and grandkids are back in school, facing new goals and challenges. And for most of us, vacation is a pleasant, if fading, memory. There's a new energy and sense of anticipation in the air. Ministries in the church are launched or reenergized (see page 1). It's time for a fresh start. In a way, it's a second New Year. Incidentally, the Jews celebrated two New Year's Days: Passover in April marked their religious new year, and the Feast of Trumpets in October their civil new year.

So the word to us for September is this: don't miss this golden opportunity to take stock, correct course if appropriate, and consider a fresh challenge. To that end, I suggest we incorporate this simple, three-step exercise into our devotions throughout the month.

- 1. Take stock of our lives by prayerfully asking ourselves these questions. What am I accomplishing? How am I growing? Am I drifting? What do I need to change? Am I ready for a new challenge? Let's write out our thoughts so we won't forget them.
 - 2. Let's correct course as needed. From time to time we all

drift into unprofitable habits. The sooner we recognize them and the more decisively we deal with them, the easier it is to correct course. For instance, we need to look for and eliminate time wasters like worthless T V shows that rob us of our priceless and irreplaceable treasure — time. As the motto on my wall daily reminds me, *Be As Drastic As Necessary!*

3. Consider taking on a new challenge. More than one, perhaps. Have our devotions been hit or miss lately? Let's set a goal and implement a plan. Redeemer has a Bible reading plan, you know. This month we're reading the oh-so-relevant-for-our-times books of 1 & 2 Corinthians. Been intending to get that exercise program going? Make your plan and get started. How about finding a fresh way to bless your family? Helping a young kid learn to read by tutoring at either Reilly or Highland Meadows Elementary School could turn his or her life around, to say nothing of the immense satisfaction you will experience by making a significant difference in a young life (To learn more about tutoring, call the church office.). Now make your own list.

Give yourself time to reflect and pray. Record your thoughts and ideas, then prayerfully, carefully make your plan. In the words of Proverbs 16:3, *Commit your work to the Lord, and your plans will be established*. Here's to an energized September!

Getting to Know You: Brian Coppinger

Brian Coppinger is one of those quality people who make Redeemer a quality family. Brian was born in the Garden State in Orange, New Jersey. Raised in the shadow of Giants Stadium, sports are in Brian's blood. He enjoys watching football and playing golf, but the "gentleman's game" of baseball is Brian's special passion. Rangers fans be gracious: Brian is a die-hard Yankees fan, but he likely got to Texas later in life than most of you did!

Brian attended North Texas State University (now The University of North Texas), graduating with a degree in business and marketing. 
Catherine L'Herisson for placing first in a recent poetry competition. The contest was sponsored by the National Federation
