Sowing Gospel Seeds with Teaching and Cookies

The inmates at Henry Wade Juvenile Detention Center have nicknamed their Monday volunteer ministry "the cookie church."

Boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 17 — awaiting sentencing or in drug rehab — choose to attend the Children's Home Bible Clubs ministry from 6:30–8 p.m. on Monday nights. The ministry is led by Redeemer member **David Wisley** and also includes volunteers **Bonnie Reese**, **Bill Keene**, **Debra Wayne**, **Edward Matthews**, **Paul Chacko** and **Gregg Potter**. Together, they lead 24 inmates in singing Gospel songs, teach a Bible lesson, work on Scripture memorization and



share cookies. Sometimes, the inmates ask for prayer or write out prayer requests that go out to believers and churches.

Baked by anonymous donors at Redeemer, the cookies may have given the team their nickname — but they're also a reminder of how the Lord has provided for this ministry. The Children's Home Bible Clubs, started by Kate Oliver Millet more than 70 years ago, has evolved over the years from a Vacation Bible School program to a traveling Bible class to the jail ministry it is today. David and his mother, **Mary Cathryn Wisley**, both serve as directors of CHBC, teaching from flannel graph and coordinating trips to the detention center. While flannel graph may be a common thing to Sunday school graduates, it's a novelty for many inmates. For some, David said, it's "so old it's new." The ministry brings the inmates something they would not have gotten otherwise, whether it's cookies, prayer time — or the Gospel.

David, an engineering firm's production manager, describes himself as the unlikeliest of teachers. He avoided oral reports in school and went through speech class several times. While the Lord has given him more public-speaking experience than most,

the Lord has also given him a far greater gift: leading these youth to the Lord and seeing them grow in Christ. In a few cases, the boys have contacted David after they've gone home, and he's been able to pray with them over the phone or meet them and their families.

"The Lord has led me to this work. My heart is there. It's seeing people's lives change and their interest in God's Word grow," David said.

Every part of the ministry

matters — even the cookies. Sometimes, the anonymous bakers write Bible verses or encouragement on the cookies' wrappings. David said the inmates cannot believe volunteers would take the time to hand-wrap cookies. It's a real ministry to them — just as real as the tracts, calendars printed by Millet the Printer and even the requested Bibles.

Q: What are your responsibilities at the school?

A: Nathan — This last year I taught ninth- and tenth-grade Bible classes, world geography and drama. This next year, I'll teach ninth-, tenth-, eleventh- and twelfth-grade Bible and lead the student discipleship team. We train students to make disciples of other students. I'm also the class adviser for the students who were freshmen last year. I'm the small-group leader for the guys in this class. I'll work with this same group of students each year until they graduate.

Q: What do you love the most about your first year?

A: Nathan — I really love the focus on discipleship. It's been a wonderful experience to be with people who have that kind of vision for the ministry. The people of the school are also a blessing.

Emily — I really love the community — going out and getting groceries and going to individual shops where I can build relationships with people. We met one guy named Rico, who sells tamales on the street. I pass him on the street every day. He wants to learn English. I felt that God wanted us to invite him to our house, so he came for dinner.
