In the autumn of 1898, two businessmen were forced to share a double room and soon discovered that both were Christians. They had their evening devotions together, and on their knees before God the thoughts were given which later developed into an association known as The Gideons. Later, the first Bible was placed in a hotel room in Montana. Today, Bibles and New Testaments are printed for distribution by The Gideons in more than 90 languages and more than 1.6 billion have been placed worldwide.

From the Pastor's Pen

The Power of One

How much impact can one person have? Most of us would say none at all or very little at best. And yet one person can change the course of society if they are but willing to make the sacrifice. What's more, collectively, a group of committed people can turn a nation. That was brought home to me when I read the story of Telemachus who was a fourth century Asiatic monk who spent most of his life in a remote community of prayer, raising vegetables for the cloister kitchen. When he was not tending his garden spot, he was fulfilling his vocation of study and prayer.

One day the monk felt the Lord leading him to Rome, the capital of the world — the busiest, wealthiest, biggest city in the world. He was understandably terrified at the thought of going to that city, but as he prayed, God's directive became clear.

Telemachus arrived in Rome during the holiday festival. In the midst of the festival the monk looked for clues as to why God brought him there.

Perhaps, he thought, it is not sheer coincidence that I have arrived at this festival time. Perhaps God has some special role for me to play.

So Telemachus let the crowd guide him, and the stream of humanity soon led him into the Coliseum where the gladiator contests were staged. He could hear the cries of the animals in their cages beneath the floor of the great arena and the clamor of the contestants preparing to do battle.

At the appointed time, the gladiators marched into the arena, saluted the emperor, and shouted, "We who are about to die salute thee." Telemachus shuddered. He had never heard of gladiator games before, but he sensed within the impending awful violence.

The crowd had come to cheer men who, for no reason other than amusement, would murder each other. Human lives were offered for entertainment. Realizing he could not sit idly by and watch this savagery, he jumped to the top of the wall and cried "In the name of Christ, stop."

The fighting began — no one paid any attention to the puny voice of one man in the crowd, so Telemachus leaped onto the sandy floor of the arena. Dashing back and forth between the muscular, armed athletes he cried, "In the name of Christ, stop!" One gladiator sent him sprawling to the ground with a blow from his shield, but Telemachus would not be deterred — "In the name of Christ, stop!" The crowd began to laugh and cheer him on, perhaps thinking he was part of the entertainment.

Then his movement blocked the vision of one of the contestants; the gladiator saw a blow coming in time. Furious now, the crowd began to cry for the intruder's blood.

"Run him through," they screamed.

The gladiator he had blocked raised his sword and with a flash of steel struck Telemachus, slashing down across his chest and into his stomach. The little monk gasped, breathing his last and cried out, "In the name of Christ, stop!"

Then a strange thing occurred. As the two gladiators and crowd focused on the lifeless body on the floor of the arena, surrounded by sand now crimson red from blood, the arena grew deathly quiet. In the silence, someone in the top tier of the stadium got up and walked out. Another followed. All over the arena, spectators began to leave until the huge stadium was emptied.

Other forces were at work, of course, but that innocent figure lying in the pool of blood crystallized the opposition, and that was the last gladiatorial contest in the Roman Coliseum. Never again did men kill each other for the crowds' entertainment in the Roman arena.

Can one person make a difference? The answer is YES! Our nation and community is reeling from immorality, wickedness, and is adrift on fundamental, foundational values. Can you make a difference? The question is not can you, but will you!

Newcomer, Janet, Andrew and Kevin Ramler, Michaela Ruffino, Charlie Reibenstein, and Saralynn Spears served with RBC missionaries **Laci and Szandra Kadar** at the Word of Life Camp in Hungary teaching English, coaching baseball

and ministering to the campers and staff. In Hungary, over 50 campers made professions of faith.

What touched the Guatemalan team most was "to see the Lord working in the hearts of Guatemalans." The team's goals were to serve, love, be a friend and be used by God to change hearts. Those goals were accomplished and God worked in great ways. However, the consistent message from the team members on their return was not only that God worked in the hearts of those they served, but that God

changed their hearts as well. They now have a greater awareness of the needs and opportunities and want to go back. They would like you to come too.
