#### Reformation Sunday: October 31

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed 95 propositions to the church door where he served as the parish priest challenging the church authorities to a debate. Last year in honor of that event, Pastor Hornok delivered a message on Martin Luther. This coming "Reformation Sunday" we will look at the second most influential person of that movement: John Calvin. Noted Church historian Philip Schaff describes Calvin as not as much of a genius as Luther or Zwingli but as having "surpassed them in consistency and self-discipline, and by his exegetical, doctrinal, and polemical writings, he has exerted and still exerts more influence than any other Reformer upon the Protestant Churches of the Latin and Anglo-Saxon races." That is indeed high praise! That Sunday's message will be unique, but also highly informative and encouraging.

Our participation will help brighten the lives of countless children by purchasing, wrapping and delivering gifts on behalf of their incarcerated parent — not only delivering a message of love from parent to child, but also the true meaning of Christmas — the good news of Jesus Christ.

Christmas connection can be the beginning of a rewarding ongoing relationship with these children and their families. We are hopeful that this ministry will continue throughout the year to help these children and their families grow in their faith, strengthen their relationships with imprisoned parents, and fulfill the purposes that God has for their lives. ## From the Pastor's Pen

#### **Effective Leaders**

The other day I came across a rather interesting memo. It was obviously fictitious and was reportedly written to Jesus, Son of Joseph from the Jordan Management Consultants. It read:

Thank you for submitting the resumes of the 12 men you have picked for management positions in your new organization. All of them have now taken our battery of tests, and we have not only run the results through our computer, but also arranged personal interviews for each of them with our psychologist and vocational aptitude consultant.

The profiles of all tests are included, and you will want to study them carefully. As part of our service we will make some general comments. They are given as a result of staff consultations and come without any additional fee.

It is the staff's opinion that most of your nominees are lacking in background, education, and vocational aptitude for the type of enterprise you are undertaking. They do not have the team concept. We recommend that you continue your search.

Simon Peter is emotionally unstable and given to fits of temper. Andrew has absolutely no qualities of leadership. The brothers, James and John, place personal interest above company loyalty. Thomas has a skeptical attitude that would tend to undermine morale. It is our duty to tell you that Matthew has been blacklisted by the Greater Jerusalem Better Business Bureau. James, the son of Alphaeus, and Thaddeus have radical leanings and show a high score on the manic-depressive scale.

Only one shows great potential ability, resourcefulness, a business mind, meets people well, ambitious, highly motivated. We recommend Judas Iscariot as your controller and right-hand man.

The first time I read that I had a pleasant laugh and then thought immediately of the verse in 1 Samuel 16 where the prophet Samuel is asked to pick the next king of Israel. The sons of Jesse are paraded before him and while outwardly many of David's older brothers looked the part, God rejected them. Then God says to Samuel: "Do not consider his appearance or his height, for I have rejected him. The Lord does not look at the things man looks at. Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart (1 Samuel 16:7 NIV)."

God is looking at the heart. But there are some definite "heart" qualities that are found in effective leaders. John Maxwell, in his book Developing the Leaders Around You, suggests the following qualities to look for in leaders. Positiveness: the ability to work with and see people and situations in a positive way. Servanthood: the willingness to submit, play team ball, and follow the leader. Growth potential: a hunger for personal growth and development; the ability to keep growing as the job expands. Follow-through: the determination to get the job done completely and with consistency. Loyalty: the willingness to always put the leader and organization above personal desires. Resiliency: the ability to bounce back when problems arise. Integrity: trustworthiness and solid character; consistent words and walk. "Big picture" mind-set: the ability to see the whole organization and all of its needs. Discipline: the willingness to do what is required regardless of personal mood. Gratitude: an attitude of thankfulness that becomes a way of life.

As I reflect on RBC, I am grateful for those who serve as leaders. As I look through the qualities needed for effective, long-term growth, I see these qualities in our Elders and Deacons and those who serve at various levels.

By the world's standards, they may not be selected as leaders, but neither would the disciples. May I encourage you to keep them in your prayers and thank God daily for their sacrifice and devotion.

Arriving home, my first instinct was to remove my shoes at the door. The motion became second nature during my vision trip to SE Asia. To help guide my travel, I was given a book that provided a prayer walk for each city I entered so I could walk and talk with our King about the spiritual battle at hand all around me. The Gospel has been present in Thailand for over 160 years now, yet still less than 1% believe its message. Many people do not know how to explain what they believe except that to be Thai is to be



Buddhist and there is no other option.

Walk down any street in Thailand and you will see a "spirit house." One such house we passed by had many bright and beautiful colored ribbons tied around a tree to attract the good spirits to look favorably on the people who worship there.

Thai people live in constant fear of their gods and spirits. They desire to welcome "good" spirits and prevent "evil" spirits from entering any building. One

method they use is to make the first step of every staircase twice as large as the others. They believe the evil spirit will not want to make its way up a step that is so large and therefore, they will be protected.

### Getting to Know You: Byron Donaho and Dan Hibbs

Byron Donaho was born in Floresville, TX (southeast of San Antonio). For seven years he lived on his dad's dairy farm, enjoying loving grandparents, and family. Byron recalled, "I had five wonderful

years with my sister, until polio took her life. After her death, and my parent's divorce, mom and I moved to Wichita Falls, where I grew up." Byron, age nine, told his mom he wanted to talk to the preacher and get baptized! He explained, "As I look back on that day, I know I was saved right then, but it was years later, when I recommitted my life to Christ, that I understood the responsibilities and privileges of my decision! Byron attended Midwestern University twice...the first time he called, "the party years," admitting, "Consequently, I flunked out, and joined the Marines!" After completing his military years, he returned to the University and earned a Business Administration degree in 1967. He and Claudette Fletcher were married during that time. In 1968, Byron began his 32-year career with Colgate Palmolive. The Donahos were blessed with two sons, **Christopher** and Jason, and four grandchildren, before Claudette's home-going

in January, 2007. Byron remembered: "We had such fun, while camping on family vacations. In 1974, I bought

our first ORANGE runabout ski boat, and in 1975 we went to Geiger Island. We traveled back year after year." Byron has continued to go to — and care for — Geiger Island, planting trees and re-constructing

> other camp facilities. As Director of Family Camp, he also helped

> > start the Redeemer Teen Camp in 2000. He maintains camping equipment as well as the youth building, along with his other ministries, including his support of missions, Teen Ministries, Sunday morning prayer time, and opening his home to visiting missionaries. (The **Hornoks** stayed in

his home, when they first arrived.) Byron loves to travel and will take anyone, anywhere, when needed. He recently traveled to Hungary, where he taught baseball and English at the Word of Life Camp. Since 2008, Byron babysits his granddaughter, Lexie, and now as Dan becomes a part of his family, he plans to spend more time at home! Dan Hibbs, a step-cousin to Claudette, was born in 1945, with Down syndrome. Byron explained, "Claudette assured Dan's mom she would take care of Dan, if and when Irene (now 90), could not. That time has come; Easter Sunday, I moved him to Dallas. I assume he will be with me until the Lord calls him home." Dan was saved at sixteen, in Wichita Falls. He enjoys The Seekers Adult Bible Fellowship, and Sunday morning prayer time.

He has already made his first trip to Geiger Island! Redeemer is indeed blessed, to have this "Dynamic Duo!"
