## Focusing on Bible Translation in Indonesia and Around the World

Q & A with Roger Doriot

Redeemer members and missionaries Roger and Suzanne Doriot spent many years living and working in the jungles of Indonesia translating Scripture for tribes there. Today, their focus is on disseminating information, raising awareness and stimulating involvement in Bible translation by Indonesians themselves. They travel frequently both in the U.S. and around the world, and The Link caught up with Roger to get an overview of their life and ministry.

#### First, why did you decide to become missionaries?

I received Christ as my personal savior when I was 10 years old. Two years later, after hearing a message on Romans 12:1 and 2, I committed my life completely to the Lord. My commitment was to do whatever the Lord wanted me to do — all my life — and wherever He wanted to use me.

However, when I finished high school, I was still not sure what God wanted me to do. I took one year of Bible college, but then, as I didn't believe the Lord wanted me to stay there and go into full-time service at that time, I transferred to engineering school. In 1966, I was graduated from Indiana Tech as a civil engineer. I worked several years in West Virginia with the highway department, helping with the start of the interstate highway program there.

But after a couple years, I begin to feel that the Lord wanted me to go back to theological school and prepare for full-time ministry of some type. I quit my job in the fall of 1968 and entered Grand Rapids Baptist Seminary in Michigan. There, during a chapel service, I heard about the great needs in Bible translation worldwide, and the Lord used that message to direct me into this emphasis in missions — to this day.

## Where did God lead you and what work did you do there?

I transferred to Dallas Theological Seminary in 1969, since it provided more Greek, Hebrew and other courses that would prepare me for Bible translation.

During my first year, I met Suzanne Fogle at Baylor University Medical Center. She was planning to be a missionary nurse. The Lord led us together and we were married in 1970.

We joined Unevangelized Fields Mission in 1972. I was graduated from DTS in 1974, and we went to Indonesia in 1975.

We began work in the Nalja tribe in the eastern highlands of Irian Jaya (west New Guinea, part of Indonesia). We focused primarily on church planting and Bible translation, but were involved in many other ministries there as well.

In 2000, we finished the Nalja New Testament. By this time, the church there was becoming self-supporting, so we began to widen our ministry in the area of Bible translation. We helped start some translation projects in some other languages. We helped train national translators. And we began to speak more in churches and theological schools about the need still existing for Bible translation in many languages.

#### What have been the results of the ministry there?

Several UFM missionaries preceded us at Nalja, making initial contact with this cannibalistic, remote, jungle tribe. The tribe had an unwritten language and they did not have a lot of interest. The work was very difficult. Finally, the first believer was baptized in 1974, a year before we arrived.

Youth before he retired from military and government duty. Early on, he also coached sports at the high school and college levels.

Barbara also graduated with a major in education. She taught for eight years in Los Angeles and for 28 years at University Park Elementary in Dallas before retiring in 2000.

John accepted Christ as Savior when he was 13 during a Billy Graham crusade. He started a Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter at a New Orleans high school. He also was involved with Coaches Outreach, a ministry for high school coaches.

Barbara was christened and confirmed in a German Evangelical and Reformed church but remained unsure of her salvation through

Christ until age 32, when she was befriended by Christian ladies who shared their relationship with Christ.

"That is when my faith began to blossom," she said. "It is a journey I am still on, and it is a gift to have John making it with me."

Fellowship Bible Church, Park Cities, previously was their home church. They came to Redeemer searching for a smaller church where people are caring and supportive of one another.

"We love the traditional style of the worship services and look forward to growing as believers and encouraging others," Barbara said. John enjoys singing in the choir. They recently traveled together to Word of Life Hungary with a Redeemer short-term mission team.

The single missionary who was there when we arrived helped us start learning the language. We helped a little with the first major baptism — 40 people — in 1976, and we started Bible translation in 1977.

With some of the first believers going out as evangelists to other villages in the jungle, God's Word began to spread. In more and more villages, fetishes were burned, baptismal classes were carried out and baptisms were held. There are now more than 40 indigenous, self-supporting churches and more than 6,000 baptized believers in the Nalja tribe of 15,000 to 20,000 people.

## What is a specific example of how God has changed lives there?

The people lived in fear and superstition. Here's one minor example of a change in their lives: Previously, if twins were born, the second one would be taken away into the forest and left to die, as they believed it was probably a spirit or a result of some special evil spirit activity. Now they welcome twins as gifts from God. Also, the treatment of women changed drastically for the better, after hearing and understanding the Scriptural principles about marriage and family.

#### What is your current ministry?

We are currently seconded — or loaned — to Wycliffe Bible Translators as the coordinator of Indonesian church relations in the United States. Our main focus is on disseminating information, raising awareness and stimulating involvement by Indonesians themselves, with regard to the great Bible translation needs still existing in Indonesia and around the world.

## How often do you return to Indonesia and what is your continuing ministry there?

We return to Indonesia each year to follow up on the ministries in which we have been involved, to assist the national church Bible translation department, and to speak in Indonesian churches and theological schools about their responsibility to get Bible translation done in the language groups of their country still needing it.

#### What is Vision 2025 and why is it important?

This is what we are passionate about! Vision 2025 is the goal to have a Bible translation project at least *started* in *every* language in the world that needs one by the year 2025, should the Lord tarry. This is vitally important because people in language groups all around the world are dying every day without understanding the Gospel!

Approximately 2,000 language groups are priority needs to have Bible translation started as soon as possible. Twenty percent of those 2,000 languages — 400 language groups — are in Indonesia. So, Indonesia is the *key* country in the whole world with respect to meeting this Vision 2025 goal.

But missionaries do not need to do all this work themselves. There are now about 13 million evangelical Christians in Indonesia. They have the churches, the theological schools, the personnel and the financial resources to accomplish most of this task themselves. However, we still need missionaries to help disseminate the information about these needs, to stimulate them to involvement, and to work alongside them to finish this great task of Bible translation, and subsequently, the Great Commission!
