## In a Word

### Give Thanks With a Grateful Heart!

In many ways, fall is my favorite season. The days are clear and cool — some mornings are actually crisp. I call it "The best of Texas!" With summer past and the kids back in school, the solid, dependable, daily routines seem to make life more predictable and productive. And the greatest holidays of the year lie just ahead — Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's. It's almost biblical: three great celebrations so tightly grouped. Actually, God gave the Jews two sets of three celebrations — one set in the spring, the other in the fall.

Of the three celebrations we're about to enjoy, Thanksgiving is my favorite. It is the least commercialized, and it is all about giving and not getting. It's about gratitude. It's about family and friends. It's about recalling and reflecting on the blessings God has lavished on us. It's about a church banquet where many of these blessings converge. Okay, it's also about autumn leaves, turkey and dressing, homemade rolls, three kinds of pies, and football. (And how about those Cowboys?).

But first things first. Thanksgiving is about giving thanks. So here's a suggestion or two that may help make this Thanksgiving the best ever. From now till Thanksgiving:

- Daily pray George Herbert's prayer, *Thou who hast given me so much, give me one more thing a grateful heart.*
- Read a Psalm of praise and gratitude each day. Start with 103, *Praise the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his bene-fits.* Other great Psalms of gratitude include 16, 18, 34, 139, 145, to name a few.
- Begin a list of things for which you are grateful. Keep it in your Bible and make it part of your daily devotions. Psalm 103 provides us with a great starter list, but don't forget the "little things" we usually take for granted. It occurred to one lady, while brushing her teeth, that she had never thanked God for her toothbrush, or, for that matter, her teeth. And how about the water that flows so dependably from our faucets?
- And while we're thanking God for his goodness, let's also thank the people who enrich our lives with their love and their investment in us. A note or call to someone now in your life or from your past — perhaps a teacher or friend — will bless you both.

Even in our times of difficulty, pain, and uncertainty, an attitude of gratitude is both appropriate and biblical. *Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus* (1 Thess 5:18).

In a word, let's all give thanks with a grateful heart!
