From the Pastor's Pen

Survivor Eva Hart remembers the night. On April 15, 1912, she was a passenger on board the Titanic during its maiden voyage. Shortly before midnight the passenger ship struck an iceberg tearing a 300 foot gash in her starboard side. Some two hours and forty minutes later the Titanic plunged 12,000 feet to the Atlantic floor. "I saw all the horror of its sinking and I heard, even more dreadful, the cries of drowning people."

The seemingly invincible ship was equipped with only twenty lifeboats and rafts — too few for a ship the size of the Titanic. But the even greater tragedy is that many of these boats were launched only partially filled. Most of the passengers ended up struggling in the icy seas while those in the boats waited a safe distance away.

Lifeboat No.14 rowed back to the scene after the "unsinkable" ship slipped from sight at 2:20 AM. Alone, it chased cries in the darkness, seeking and saving a few precious lives. Incredibly, no other lifeboat joined it. While a few lifeboats were overloaded, most were not. Fearing desperate swimmers would cling to and swamp their boats, many of those who had been saved rowed their half-filled boats aimlessly in the darkness, hearing the cries of the lost yet doing nothing.

Jesus Christ said, "I came to seek and to save the lost." He has commissioned us to do the same. Our task as a church and as individuals is to "rescue the perishing, care for the dying." Tragically, our boat is not even half full (and will never be full) and yet many of us act as if it were. While people drown in the treacherous waters around us, we are tempted to stay dry and make certain no one rocks the boat. Yet, the boat is not ours, and our safety came at the expense of the One who trumped fear with love — and saved us.

Fear often keeps us from taking action. Fear of rejection by those we are trying to help. Fear that those we try to help will think us odd or strange. Fear that once newcomers come on board our ship, in time we will no longer have control. All of these issues can be overcome by our love for the Lord Jesus Christ and for those whom Christ Himself loves.

During the coming months, we as a church family will have many ways to reach out to people through special events and activities. Thanksgiving, Christmas, and small group gatherings are wonderful opportunities to let people know we love and care for them. Additionally, in January we are going to be having a special weekend called "Operation Friendship" with evangelist Larry Moyer.

Tragically, some within our "life boat" will behave as if our boat is full and we can take on no more. While never verbalizing such a position some will act as if our boat will capsize and we all perish if others are invited to our church. "Ridiculous!" you say? How many people who are perishing have you invited on board? We always appreciate people from other evangelical churches in our community coming to our special events, but aren't they already in a lifeboat? During these upcoming ministry events, join me in making a special effort to invite those in, who (as yet) are without the Savior. Even if they refuse, you will at least have made the effort.

To prepare for our outreach emphasis, RBC is making available Larry Moyer's book, *31 Days with the Master Fisherman*, to be used for your November devotions. Hopefully, you've picked up your copy and are using it. If not, let us know and we will be happy to secure one for you.

Redeemer's Newest Missionaries, The Pikmans

Meet our newest missionaries, the **Pikmans**.

Vladimir Pikman was born to an educated Jewish family in Kiev, Ukraine. Although his family neither knew the Messiah nor took God seriously, deep inside Vladimir believed God was alive and had a plan for his life. Convinced true happiness

for a Jew could only be found by living in Israel, Vladimir moved there only to discover that the happiness he sought did not come. In his disappointment and confusion, Vladimir reached out to God by sticking a note in the Western ("Wailing") Wall, asking God for guidance and direction. When Vladimir returned home to Kiev in 1992, he met a group of believers who shared the truth that Jesus was the Messiah and challenged him to study the scriptures. As a result of this study, Vladimir accepted Jesus as his personal Savior and devoted his life to serving the Lord through Jewish evangelism.

Vladimir and his wife, **Inna**, both graduated from Dallas Theological Seminary: Vladimir with a Master of Theology and Inna with a Masters in Biblical Linguistics. Currently Vladimir and Inna are pursuing doctoral degrees in Germany. A gifted musician and vocalist, Inna serves as a worship leader in Berlin's Messianic congregation and has recorded several albums. She also teaches biblical Hebrew

and Greek at the Messianic Institute of Berlin.

The Pikmans have two daughters, **Elishevah** (8) and **Shoshannah** (6). Vladimir and Inna are encouraged that Russian Jews are immigrating to Germany in great numbers, providing many new opportunities to share the gospel. Please pray God would grant the wisdom, courage, and strength needed for the Pikmans to accomplish His will in their many ministries. Also please seek God's favor in Vladimir and Inna's parents coming to know Jesus as their Messiah.

Herb Cavender in was born in Midlothian. Texas. He, his brother, sister, and parents moved to the Garland area when he was fourteen. Reflecting on those days, Herb said, "For many years my dad and I worked on a large farm, located on Centerville and Barnes Bridge, until the farm sold in 1950." Herb told about meeting Millie during those years, as her family lived in the neighboring farm. Millie commented, "He used to come and see my brothers, but he didn't even act interested in me at all!" She continued, "My father passed away when I was eighteen months old, therefore, my three brothers, sister, and I grew up in a single-parent home. Our

mom was a wonderful Christian lady, who gave us much love. We didn't have many material things, and we all worked hard to make a living. We moved to the Reinhardt area of Dallas when I was very young."

Herb and Millie actually started dating the summer of 1947, marrying on December, 18, 1948. They feel very blessed to have celebrated 61 years together and are "still going!" Millie shared, "We have four children, who chose wonderful spouses. They have given us eleven grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, and one more due in April!" You may have guessed it from their faithful Wednesday night meal help: the Cavenders love to cook. Herb remarked, "Millie cooks on the inside and I cook on the outside! We also enjoy gardening and good times with our family." After giving up farming, Herb served with the Dallas Police Department for 20 years. While there He received

an Associates Degree in Police Science from Central Texas College. In 1970 he accepted a position with The University of Texas System Police in Austin, TX. He worked with the University Police until his disability retirement in 1988. Herb explained: "A doctor in Austin told me I only had a year to live, unless I

had a heart transplant! We moved back to Dallas for a second opinion and to pray and wait to see if things would change. The verdict, however, was the same, and our miracle came in the way of a heart transplant on February 18, 1990." Millie added: "We had twenty-nine

churches praying, and that proves what prayer can do!" Herb commented, "We claimed Ezekiel 36:25-26 and are so thankful God has kept my new heart working for over 20 years now!" Herb and Millie also experienced sad times. Millie's mother was killed in an automobile accident while returning home from Reinhardt Bible Church in 1954, where Millie had accepted Christ at age 12. Herb trusted Jesus as his Savior at a little country church when he was eleven.

Herb and Millie joined Redeemer in 2005. Millie commented: "It is great to belong to a more traditional church. We enjoy the Berean Class and the solid preaching. We are looking forward to getting to know and serve with **Doug and Connie**."
