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

From the Pastor's Pen

The Indescribable Gift

There are several reasons why you or I might not be able to describe a Christmas gift. It may be that we are so overcome with emotion that "words fail us." Or we might be unable to identify the gift. We might open it and say, "It's beautiful, just what I always wanted. Uh—what is it?" Or we might care so little for a gift that we might not even bother to describe it.

What can possibly make a gift indescribable? Since all human presents are describable, it is clear that the only thing that can make a gift *in*describable is that it is more than human. It has to have something of God mixed with it. That is precisely what Paul was thinking of when he penned the words found in 2 Corinthians 9:15. In the context, Paul had been thinking of human gifts: the gifts of the Corinthians to the poor in Jerusalem. But the subject of giving had turned his mind to God and the gift of Christ to his people, which is the greatest of all possible gifts. Having made reference to this special blessing, Paul says, "Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!"

Why is the gift of God beyond description? First, the nature of the gift itself. The gift is Christ. So, in order to describe fully this gift, we must be able to describe who Jesus is and what he has done for us, which we cannot do. Jesus described himself as being one with God the Father, and the Scripture everywhere testifies to that fact. His names Jesus (Jehovah saves) and Immanuel (God with us) affirm that Jesus is God. Because Jesus is God, and God is indescribable, we cannot describe the gift. But the gift consists also of what he has done for us. Jesus came to provide salvation for us by his sacrifice on the cross, and we cannot adequately describe that. God has given us words and terms by which to understand it. We have words

Ken Ham and Britt Beemer in their book, Already Gone: Why your kids will quit the Church and What You Can Do to Stop It, make this profound statement: "If we teach our children (or anyone) to take God's Word as written concerning the Resurrection, the miracles of Jesus, and the account of Jonah and the great fish that swallowed him but then tell them we don't need to take Genesis as written but can reinterpret it on the basis of the world's teaching about millions of years and evolution — we have unlocked a door ... to undermine biblical authority. We are really saying, "We want you to take God's Word as written according to literature and language in certain places — but not here at the beginning of Genesis." According to surveys of thousands of young people, this disconnect is at the heart of young people's lack of confidence in churches. Ham and Beemer write: "Churches that defend God's Word and live by God's Word can once again become 'the real deal' to the generation of young adults that has left and the next generation that is teetering on the edge." Is there a solution? A new series for Junior High to Adults on Wednesday nights, beginning January 12, entitled "A Ready Defense" will provide those answers.

like sacrifice, atonement, propitiation and reconciliation. But how Jesus achieved the work of reconciliation by dying for us remains an indescribable mystery.

The gift is also indescribable because of the grace by which it is given. Most of our gifts have nothing to do with grace. We give to others because they're in our family or are our friends. Rarely do we give to our enemies. Yet God's gift was granted to those who are in sin and have risen up against God and declared war against the Almighty. God's actions go beyond the limits of human speech. God's gift at Christmas is not given to a selected few; it cries out, "Joy to the world!"

The third reason why the gift is "indescribable" is the effects it produces. The gift accomplishes forgiveness of sins; being justified before the bar of God's justice; being adopted into God's family; as God's children we are God's heirs; the gift of the Holy Spirit who unites us to Christ forever; divine peace which goes beyond circumstances and is beyond any poor human efforts to describe; finally, we have a home in heaven prepared for us by Christ.

As Christmas approaches we thank God for His gift and speak to others. In the Christmas story nearly everyone spoke to others about God's gift. The wise men said, "We have seen his star in the east and have come to worship him" (Matthew 2:2). The shepherds "spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child" (Luke 2:17). Simeon "praised God" (Luke 2:28). Anna, the prophetess, "gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem" (Luke 2:38). This Christmas, let's declare the message!

Join in Praying for Youth

The Scriptures are filled with numerous examples of how God chose young men and women to accomplish great works of faith for His glory. Youth like Josiah and Timothy, and Esther and Mary, stepped forward with great faith. As a result, our Lord used them to complete tasks which appeared impossible: restore a nation to God, pastor a rapidly growing church, save Israel from destruction, and even bring the Incarnate Son into the world!

Our God works mightily through young men and women. For this reason, we believe He will utilize our youth to accomplish for the Gospel's sake what may appear as impossible. During Sunday fellowship in the month of November we studied what it means to "Run with Faith," and on Wednesdays enjoyed thoughtful times of testimony and worship. This year's service at the Thanksgiving Banquet and the afterglow party were also a blast. Upcoming events include: the Christmas Discipleship Retreat on the weekend of Dec. 10-12, and outreach at the Buckner Retirement Village on Dec. 15. Please join us in prayer as we expectantly look forward to what God has in store for the awesome youth of Redeemer!
