A rich heritage

Henry and Ruth Geiger moved from Pennsylvania to Overton County, Tenn., in 1922 and began their ministry in the rural farming community of Oak Grove. In the late 1920s, local judges and doctors encouraged them to establish a home for needy children. They bought a farm adjoining their property and opened an orphanage in 1931. They had no organization behind them, the Great Depression had hit, and support was unpredictable and limited. But God always provided.

By the early 1940s, most of the children in the orphanage were grown or had been placed with families, and the Geigers decided to begin a Bible camp on the property. They built and then updated a swimming pool, cabins and other facilities through the years. The Geigers were involved in the leadership of the camp until Henry's death in 1983.

A vibrant future

In the last 70 years, multitudes of children and young people have come to Christ through the camp's ministry. We are excited about what God will do during the next 70 years to better serve the needs of campers, families and groups year-round. Our plans include an additional 10 comfortable cabins, a meeting room for large gatherings, and a new swimming pool and adjacent bath house.
